Doing More Together!

BRHS + Henderson County + City of Hendersonville = SNIP

Part of the Blue Ridge Humane Society's mission is to reduce the overpopulation of companion animals. With support from the City of Hendersonville and Henderson County, BRHS is able to offer low cost spay-neuter for dogs and cats in our new **Spay-Neuter Incentive Program**, or **SNIP**.


Pet owners must be residents of Henderson County in order to get their animals spayed or neutered through SNIP. Our website at this link lists the documents accepted for proof of Henderson County residency: www.blueridgehumane.org/community-services/snip.

Owners must go to the County Animal Services Center located at 828 Stoney Mountain Road to complete the application process. There, pet owners will be asked to fill out a quick survey and an admission form provided by Humane Alliance, a program of the ASPCA. Surgeries are performed at Humane Alliance's state-of-theart veterinary clinic in Asheville. A \$10 fee, which includes the surgery and rabies vaccine, will be charged at the County Animal Services Center when the surgery appointment is made. There are additional services

that can be provided at modest added cost (see our website at the link above). On the day of the appointment, pets must be dropped off between 8:00 and 8:15 AM at the County Animal Services Center at 828 Stoney Mountain Road. Pets must be picked up between 11:30 AM and Noon at the County Animal Services Center on the day following the surgery.

Since July 1^{st} , over 184 different pet owners signed up for the program, totaling over 108 dogs and cats. The important purpose of spay/neuter programs is to keep unwanted pets out of shelters in the first place. Reproduction rates of intact pets are daunting: A single pair of cats and their kittens could produce as many as 420,000 kittens in just 7 years. For dogs, the number is over 67,000 in just 6 years.

BRHS + ASPCA = "PROJECT TRANSPORT"

BRHS has now joined the ASPCA's national animal relocation network, strategically replacing our own volunteer driver re-location program. "Based on the theories of supply and demand, the ASPCA's Animal Relocation program saves lives and gives shelter pets the best chance of finding safe and loving homes by transporting them from areas of oversupply--where the likelihood of adoption is slim--to locations where there are few, if any, similar animals in shelters and the chances of adoption are greater."

Additionally, relocating our Shelter's adoptable pets to partner agencies frees space in our Shelter for other animals in need here. The program is a win-win situation: It relieves over-crowding, frees up needed space, meets the demand in the destination shelter, and increases the chances for adoption of the transferred animals.

BRHS is in dire need of volunteers to foster our animals slated for this ASPCA relocation program. Here's how it works: The foster person picks up the animals(s) at the Shelter, completes foster paperwork, and receives information and supplies for the animal(s); fosters them at home; brings them back to the Shelter for a health

check; and then later drops them off at the Shelter the morning of the next scheduled ASPCA transport. The ASPCA takes over from there, providing their own van and driver for the pets' ride to the destination receiving agency.




Adoption Gone Viral -- Say Cheese!

New forever home and love story provided by Lisa De Voe:

"Atty came into my life at just the right time, of course. It had been about 4 years since I had a pup. My precious, precious pup had been with me for about 15 years, so it took some time before I felt ready again. I met Atty twice



"It took weeks, even months, to gain his trust. He slept on his own bed in a different room than my bedroom. We had adventures daily, ate treats, played with toys, did zoomies. Slowly but surely he started opening up. One day I panicked because I couldn't find him anywhere in the house. I checked the bedroom last because he'd rarely be in there. There he was on my bed, on his back, all four legs straight in the air! He's really tall so it just looked so silly. I walked over and he was wide awake, staring at me, asking for a belly rub that he was now trusting me to give. Tiny ways of sharing trust with me would appear each day, from rubs to snuggles, and shortly he took over my bed.

"Atty is extremely smart, he understands more words than any animal I've had. He's stoic and goofy all at once--loving, brave, and adventurous. We go on mountain hikes every single day. He's not very demanding, he's quiet (unless a bear is around), and he's never gone to the bathroom in the house since he's lived with me, so unlike my experiences with other pups with their initial adoption anxiety.

"I started taking photos with my phone because Atty would sit and pose for me and often smile! He rekindled my love for photography, so I invested in a better camera eventually. Taking photos and adventuring daily in the mountains have reconnected me to nature in a way that makes me appreciate everything in my life so much deeper. And I can't imagine having a better partner to explore with. We started an Instagram account because we wanted to find a way to give back to Blue Ridge Humane Society. His Instagram exploded after a short time of actively being on there, and he now has over 6,000 followers and an awesome dog community of support. We have a fundraising contest planned for Instagram in October on his adoption anniversary.

"I think the most rewarding thing about Atty joining our family is that he's shown me how to make love simple, and that's really how it should be."



Sheryl Mann: Lifesaving Shelter Animal Photographer

Ever wonder who takes all those gorgeous photos that you've seen on our facebook pages, on our website, and in our newsletters? Meet Sheryl Mann, animal photographer. This



talented artist volunteers her time taking exquisite photos of the animals at our Shelter, photos that reveal each animal's personality, providing their very best first chance at finding a good home. We are delighted to highlight her interview with us:

BRHS: How did you get into pet photography?

"I've always appreciated a wonderful photo and as I took some classes and learned the technical details of photography, I realized that I loved it. I discovered an animal photography class, and my instructor gave me feedback that literally changed my life 8 years ago: She encouraged me to seek out animal shelters and donate my time and budding skills to help get animals adopted. She said that shelter photography was a great training ground for a future in professional animal photography, AND I could give some animals



a boost by helping get them noticed. It was at that point that I connected with HeARTsSpeak and began reaching out to local area rescues...and my life changed."

BRHS: How did you connect with BRHS?

"I received a very nice email from staff at the Shelter, asking if I had any time or wish to help the animals at Blue Ridge. After a few quick conversations, I packed up my mobile studio and started making bi-monthly visits to the Shelter. That was almost two years ago."

BRHS: How rewarding do you find this work?

"I have a huge soft spot for animals. I dedicate my life to as many animals as I can because I believe they are a gift. They help us in so many ways--from lowering our blood pressure to calming our nerves to detecting health issues. They find lost stuff, whether they be things or people. They rescue us when we need help--off a snowy mountain or out of deep water. We, in turn, care for them with companionship, food, love, and shelter. We love them like our own kids. We grieve for them as family members. We celebrate their birthdays and mourn their passing. I believe our lives are made more complete when we have the love and trust of an animal companion. As a professional, my goal is to show how complex these relationships are in photos. I love telling an image story about how amazing dogs can be and how underestimated they are sometimes. Dogs really do have many different emotions and you can see them when you freeze time in an image. I volunteer photography services because I want to see more people experience the positive life-changing magic that happens when you bring home a rescue animal. I believe that my knack for a compelling portrait/story could catch the eye of just the right person or family to make a

match happen. To play a part in that process brings my heart so much joy!"

For saving animals' lives one photo at a time, we say simply, "Thank you, Sheryl."
